### So What Happens Next?

The outgoing president becomes a Director for a 2 year term, and, as **Kathy Krajewski** has already been nominated for First Vice President, we need nominations for 4 vacancies: the President and Second Vice President, and 2 Directors. The Board of Directors has proposed a nominating committee to locate nominees and oversee our election.

### What Do the Officers and Directors Do?

The **President** chairs our regular meetings and the Board meetings, and supervises the general interests of the club. She works with the other officers to ensure the club runs

smoothly, and represents the club to the Federation. Although in the past the President has usually written and published the newsletter, it is not necessarily part of the job, and your current editor is willing to continue, with input from the new President, if she so desires.

The **Second Vice President** is responsible for the Hospitality Committee sign-ups, and making sure the monthly Chairs understand what to do to nourish the hungry hordes. **Kathy** instituted a new procedure this year, so the 2nd VP does not have to be at the Annex early to open up, or stay late to lock up, and the position is much less demanding as a result. She also wrote a description of the duties, so it's easier to get started.

**Directors** help bring new ideas to the club, and help keep us on track. They attend 9 or 10 BOD meetings per year, which are held on the second Thursday of the month at 7 p.m., last a little over an hour, and generally include homemade cookies.

Please consider volunteering for one of these positions, as it is a great way to have some fun, make great friends, and help the club, all at the same time. The roles are less work than they used to be, due to some changes made last year in the way we work and what the jobs entail.

## Horticulture **Farm Plants 10,000 Daffodils**

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You may recall that at last year's plant sale, Arrowhead Farm donated a dozen or so \$25 Gift Certificates, a raft of discount vouchers, and several lovely plants to our sale. They were a relatively new operation, at the time, and certainly entered the Support your Local Garden Club effort with a splash.

This fall, they planted ten thousand daffodil bulbs, which in their first year will produce about 30 thousand blooms. According to an article in the Daily News, the farm has done this in anticipation of its 325th anniversary celebration in 2008. Arrowhead has been operated by the same family at its Old Ferry Road location in Newburyport since 1683. They run a crop rotation of fresh fruits and vegetables,

green-house grown garden plants, forage crops, livestock and forest products, which they either sell from the farm's retail location, or to wholesalers within a 100 mile radius of Newburyport.

This should be quite a spectacular display this spring, so mark your calendar!

# What was that Salad??

Even though I couldn't be there in person, my reporters brought news of the unseemly crowd hovering around **Carole Ward's** contribution to the Holiday Festivities at Donna's house in December. I **know** some of you went back for thirds, and I have your names. And I have a tape measure. Sure, Carole says it's not fattening ...

**Cranberry-Broccoli Salad**

Recipe from Carole Ward

**Salad**

- 1-1/2 c Fresh or Frozen Cranberries, halved
- 3/4 c Sugar
- 1 bunch Broccoli Florets (about 4 cups)
- 4 c Cabbage, shredded
- 1 c Walnuts or Pecans, in large pieces
- 4 slices Bacon, cooked and crumbled
- 1/2 c Golden Raisins
- 1 Red Onion, thinly sliced

**Dressing** (the proportion of these ingredients can be varied according to taste)

- 2/3 c Light Mayonnaise
- 1/3 c Non-fat Yogurt
- 1/3 c Sugar
- 2 tsp. Vinegar

Put the cranberries and sugar in bowl and set aside until sugar is dissolved. You can substitute Craisins for the sugared cranberries.

Cook the bacon, drain and crumble. (If not serving the salad the same day, save bacon until ready to serve.) Shred cabbage in food processor or by hand. Slice onion, very thinly.

In large salad bowl, mix cabbage, onion, broccoli florets, nut pieces, raisins, and cranberry mixture. Mix in the dressing and refrigerate for an hour or so. When ready to serve, crumble the bacon and stir in. The salad keeps several days in the refrigerator. This is a very tasty, very healthy dish, and it looks just gorgeous on the table.
